

# 4. Listen Up: SYNC Audiobooks for Summer are Here!

For several years now, audiobook publishers have partnered with <a href="SYNC">SYNC</a> to provide free audiobook downloads each week throughout summer. The SYNC program pairs a current young adult title with a classic or required summer reading title. Each SYNC audiobook will be available for download for a period of 7 days, and once downloaded can be listened to at any time. OverDrive is providing distribution services for all the SYNC audiobooks. The titles are all in MP3 format and can be downloaded via <a href="OverDrive Media Console">OverDrive Media Console</a> for Windows, Mac and most mobile devices.



To help promote SYNC, we've created an email template for you to use. All you have to do is paste <a href="mailto:the-body-of-an-email">this image</a> into the body of an email, add a hyperlink to <a href="http://www.audiobooksync.com">http://www.audiobooksync.com</a>, and send to your patron email list. Additional promotional materials available in the SYNC tool kit.

The SYNC program is a great way to introduce teens to audiobooks, and in turn those audiobook fans will look to your library as a source for more great audiobooks. Keep a lookout on our blog for ways to promote audiobooks in June in honor of <u>Audiobook Month</u>.

## 5. 23 Mobile Things for Libraries

"Welcome to 23 mobile things for libraries!

When Helene Blowers and the team at the Public Library of Charlotte and Mecklenberg County <u>launched the first 23 things program</u> in 2006 they took the

library world by storm. A self paced course that offers library workers the chance to build their awareness, knowledge and skills at their own pace is a fun professional development tool. This program builds on their concept and seeks to explore the added potential of mobile devices."

#### Why **mobile** this time around?

"We are interested in exploring ways that libraries and library staff can use mobile technologies to deliver library services, to engage with their communities and for their own professional development. Research from PEW Internet explores how rapidly communities are moving to accessing their library services and websites via their own mobile device. The user experience in your library (or museum) through the lense of a mobile device may be quite different, Ditte Laursen shares some insights in this video."

They'll be covering lots of <u>great topics</u> -- social reading, augmented reality, curating, Adobe ID, productivity tools, file sharing, music, digital storytelling, and many others! For each "Thing" you'll find background, a list of activities to try to become more familiar with the topic/tool/site, and some "thinking points." The <u>FAQ</u> covers how the program works, how much time it will take, and what you'll need to get started. It sounds like a great way to explore mobile technologies!

# 8. 2014 LSTA Grant Information

The 2014 LSTA Information and Guidelines is now posted on the Public Library Development website at <a href="http://pld.dpi.wi.gov/pld\_lsta">http://pld.dpi.wi.gov/pld\_lsta</a>, along with an LSTA Grant Application Worksheet (in Word format suitable for preparation only--grants must be submitted online). The publication is available online only, but is in a format suitable for printing. The Guidelines present the LSTA grant categories for 2014 for library and library systems, and instructions on the application process. The worksheet will be particularly useful to new applicants, and helps clarify the terminology and expectations in the application process.

In 2014, there will be six competitive grant categories that include: Digital Creation Technology; Digitization of Library Historical Material (new in 2014); Serving Special Populations: Accessibility; Early Literacy (new in 2014); Literacy; and Merging Integrated Library Systems.

Grant category descriptions are now posted in the online 2014 LSTA Information and Guidelines (<a href="http://pld.dpi.wi.gov/files/pld/pdf/guide14.pdf">http://pld.dpi.wi.gov/files/pld/pdf/guide14.pdf</a>).

The 2014 LSTA grant application training webinar took place May 23, 2013 from 11 a.m. to 12 p.m. The session was hosted by members of the Department of Public Instruction's Public Library Development team including Terrie Howe, LSTA Program Coordinator; Tessa Michaelson Schmidt, Youth and Special Services Consultant, and John DeBacher, Director of Public Library Development.



## 9. Libraries and the Broadband Technology Opportunities Program

U.S. Public Libraries and the Broadband Technology Opportunities Program

In our increasingly global and hyper-connected world, closing the digital divide--and getting all Americans online--is critical to the nation's economic development and the empowerment of its citizens. America's public libraries are part of the solution, and the federal Broadband Technology Opportunities Program (BTOP) has strengthened libraries' ability to meet this challenge.

NTIA established BTOP to increase broadband access and adoption nationwide, and U.S. state and public libraries have been critical partners in many of these projects around the country. These



investments have enabled libraries to improve their public access technology resources, better address workforce development needs, expand digital literacy training opportunities, and create stronger community linkages and integrated services. This report from the American Library Association presents library projects nationwide, and provides a broad look at the library improvements and community impacts resulting from BTOP funding. Wherever possible, data has been pulled from fourth quarter 2012 reports filed to NTIA, or in some cases, information provided by BTOP grantees.
