 - Type and quality of construction
 - Slab
 - Basement
 - Wood frame
 - Hazardous material remediation
 - Quality of materials used
 - Efficiency of the space
 - Load bearing walls
 - Accessibility
 - Shaping the library to the space instead of shaping the space to the library needs
 - Stairs
 - Balconies
 - Bank safes or other items that are costly to remove

- Considerations
 - Building Conditions
 - Age of structure
 - Condition of electric, plumbing, and HVAC systems
 - Accessibility
 - Natural lighting
 - Ceiling heights
 - Roof
 - Floor loading
 - Libraries require 150 pounds per square feet
 - General Considerations
 - Location
 - Site contamination
 - Parking
 - Size of building
 - Cost to acquire and convert




